The story behind the Christmas Carol - Good King Wenceslas



It's a convoluted, complex confusing story but the underlying tale is that people must be charitable at Christmas.

John Mason Neale wrote Good King Wenceslas in 1853 to a traditional folk tune while he was living at Sackville College in the town of East Grinstead in West Sussex. It was sung as a Spring Carol for a few hundred years. It was believed that the King of Bohemia from over 1000 years ago, looked out of his castle on Boxing Day, saw peasants and gave them food and wood.

However, this is not the real tale. Wenceslas' father was the Duke of Bohemia who was a Christian, but his mother may have been a pagan. His father died when he was twelve, but because he was too young to become Duke, his mother took control of the land as regent until he turned 18. It was his grandmother Ludmilla who looked after Wenceslas, bringing him up as a Christian, smuggling priests into the house to educate him. On hearing of Ludmilla's secret works, the Regent had her banished to a distant castle. She was murdered by the Queen's guards.


Wenceslas remained a Christian even after his

grandmother's death, smuggling in local Bishops at night to teach him the Bible. At 18, when took control of his dukedom, he banished his mother and her pagan followers from his castle. He was a good duke, establishing both a good education system and successful law and order mechanisms into the dukedom. In that he was a good king, with a good heart, treating his people with kindness and love.

However, when he was 22, his brother Boleslav, plotted to kill Wenceslas, inviting him to celebrate a saint's day. On the way to the church, Wenceslas was stabbed to death by Boleslav's followers.

The story in the carol however is deemed fictitious and written by Czech poet Václav Alois Svoboda in 1847 in three languages – Czech, German and Latin. It was called 'Sankt Wenceslaw und Podiwin'- Saint Wenceslas and the Crocheteer. It was British poet J M Neale who translated the words and placed it into the tune of the 13th century spring carol 'Tempus Adest Floridum' – It is time for flowering.

The song was made popular by Bing Crosby and became staple Christmas music fare.




Jacob

Netherlee Cottage

Netherlee Cottage is a rehabilitation centre for ladies from Mulleriyawa Mental Health Hospital.



We opened the doors of Netherlee to help our neighbours. The younger member of the next-door family had COVID19 but the elderly lady was negative for COVID19, so to protect her she came to lodge at the Cottage, much to the delight of the Netherlee residents. The neighbour was initially stressed about her situation and that of her daughter but the Netherlee Cottage ladies used their skills of learning to care for others to make her feel welcome. They all benefited from new company and conversation during a lockdown period and celebrated all together at a local restaurant when the danger had passed.

Senuda, another friend to Netherlee Cottage enjoyed teaching the ladies how to make Kottu.

Kottu is a Sri Lankan dish consisting of diced roti stir-fried with egg, onions, chillies, spices, and vegetables.

Everyone spent the day cooking for everyone to enjoy together.

Following training at Netherlee Cottage, the ladies move to the

Community House to continue their next stage of rehabilitation and move towards independent living and we are constantly working with the local health service to ensure the continuance of this facility. The residents of the Community House work as cleaners and they have contribute Rs 4,000 every month from their salary into a communal savings account, to ensure there's sufficient funds to pay for next year's rent.

The Lease has been signed for another year and although there is an administrative delay to transferring the funds for the rent, we expect the programme to continue.

Thank you to Netherlee Church in Glasgow for their continued friendship and support of the residents and thanks also to individuals for their support and friendship to the ladies and staff at the Cottage.

The month the world came to Glasgow



The long-awaited COP26 Climate Summit in Glasgow has come to a close, making important progress in a number of areas — but not enough. The world still remains off track to beat back the climate crisis. Our understanding of the role of Christians is to be supportive of all progressive leadership in this area and to be willing to protest and sing for the changes necessary.

Glasgow has a great reputation as a city of song, so I attended a singing protest at the Scottish parliament in Edinburgh where we learned this new hymn:



A WAKE-UP CALL

The world is made by your creative hand You made us stewards of sky, and sea and land. And yet with carelessness or cruel design We've wrought so much destruction over time.

We've caused the trees to burn, the seas to rise, Dispersed our carbon clouds throughout the skies, plundered the earth for all that we could gain, and treated warning voices with disdain.

This story is not over - recognising the urgency of the challenge. Government ministers from all over the world agreed that countries should come back next year to submit stronger 2030 emissions reduction targets with the aim of closing the gap to limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees Celcius. Ministers also agreed that developed countries should urgently deliver more resources to help climate-vulnerable countries adapt to the dangerous and costly consequences of climate change that they are feeling already — from dwindling crop yields to devastating storms.

Going beyond headline targets, leaders explained the steps their countries are taking to deliver these commitments; including action on coal, cars, cash and trees, among others.

A significant number of leaders spoke about ending coal power. 42 countries have set coal phase out dates and international public finance for coal is coming to an end.

There was an encouraging commitment to working together to achieve climate aims, including with the private sector, international organisations and civil society. Significant announcements included:

Over 40 leaders joined the Breakthrough Agenda, a 10-year plan to work together to create green jobs and growth globally, making clean technologies and solutions the most affordable, accessible and attractive option before 2030 – beginning with power, road transport, steel, hydrogen and agriculture.

- Over 120 countries covering more than 90% of the world's forests endorsed the Glasgow Leaders' Declaration on Forests & Land Use committing to work collectively to halt and reverse forest loss and land degradation by 2030, backed by the biggest ever commitment of public funds for forest conservation and a global roadmap to make 75% of forest commodity supply chains sustainable.
- A Just Energy Transition Partnership was announced to support South Africa's decarbonisation efforts; a powerful example of collaboration between an emerging economy and international partners.
- The launch of the Global Methane Pledge saw over 100 countries committing collectively to reduce global methane emissions by 30% by 2030.

Some of our Christian songs seem to have more energy than the conference debates which was rather an anticlimax. However, the protesters were colourful and persistent. Heave you with another song to ponder:

We're on a planet
That has a problem
We've got to solve it, get involved
And do it now, now, NOW
We need to build a better future
And we need to start right now (Tune Bella Ciao)


